Accounting 1A is the first course in a three course series at De Anza College. The first two courses cover financial accounting and the third course deals with managerial accounting.

Course Objectives:

- *Learn to analyze fundamental business concepts, how businesses operate and how accounting system serves them.
- *Understand fundamental accounting concepts and methods underlying preparation of financial statements.
- *Learn to read and prepare financial statements, and to use basic tools to evaluate financial results.

Course Description:

This course is the first course in the concepts and methods underlying preparation of financial statements utilizing generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Topics include the analysis of business transactions, the usage of debits and credits, the complete accounting cycle, , and the preparation of the basic financial statements.

SLO (Student Learning Outcomes) for this course:

1. Demonstrate a knowledge of double entry accounting for business transactions and adjustments and prepare, explain and analyze financial statements using GAAP.
2. Analyze fundamental business concepts, how businesses operate, how accounting serves them and identify ethical issues in an accounting context.
