<b>Class Time and Location</b>	MTWRF 8:30-9:20, 11:30-12:20 MLC108																										
<b>Course Description</b>	Conic sections, parametric equations, systems of equations and inequalities, vectors, lines and planes, sequences and series, polar coordinates, mathematical induction, and the binomial theorem.																										
<b>Course SLO</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Analyze, investigate, and evaluate linear systems, vectors, and matrices related to two or three dimensional geometric objects.</li> <li>2. Graph and analyze regions/curves represented by inequalities or trigonometric, polar, and parametric equations, including conic sections.</li> <li>3. Analyze, develop, and evaluate formulas for sequences and series. Justify those formulas by mathematical induction.</li> </ol>																										
<b>Course Text</b>	Precalculus with Limits, 2 <sup>nd</sup> edition, by Larson, published by Brooks/Cole, Cengage Learning, 2007.																										
<b>Required Materials</b>	The textbook, a graphing calculator (TI-83 or 84 is preferred if you are buying a new calculator. If you already have a TI-82, 85, or 86, you can use that.)																										
<b>Course Prerequisites</b>	Mathematics 41 and 52 (both with a grade of C or better); or a satisfactory score on Calculus Readiness test within the last calendar year. Advisory: English Writing 211 and Reading 211 (or Language Arts 211), or English as a Second Language 272 and 273.																										
<b>Method of Instruction</b>	This class will consist of lectures and in-class discussion. There will also be boardwork and in-class group assignments which you are expected to participate in.

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The top two scores in class that are above 98% will receive A+. The student is responsible for saving all graded, returned work. There will be no discussion of grade discrepancies unless the student has a graded copy of the work in question.

<b>Tests and Quizzes</b>	<p>There will be three in-class tests, each counting as 15%. <b>absolutely no makeup tests</b>. If you miss a test due to what I consider an emergency and you provide appropriate documentations, I will replace that one grade with your final. If I don't consider your reasoning as an emergency, you will receive a zero for that test. Regardless, you will get zero for any other missed tests, emergency or not. No makeups for the final can be provided. The final grade cannot be dropped.</p> <p>Quizzes will be given randomly at any part of the class period. There are <b>absolutely no makeup quizzes</b>. A missed quiz for any reason (including coming late or leaving early) will count as a zero.</p>
<b>Homework</b>	<p>In the course schedule I have included a list of suggested homework problems from each sections. You are responsible to do at least all of the suggested problems. You are responsible to know how to do ALL of the problems. There is a direct correlation between your level of comfort with the homework problems and your success in this class. If I feel a majority of you are not doing the homework, I may increase the number of quizzes or start collecting the homework from each section. You must keep a copy of all turned in work for you own review. Assume you will not get any of your homework you turn in back.</p>
<b>Class Attendance and Faculty Initiated Withdrawal Policy</b>	<p><b>A student who discontinues coming to class and does not drop the course will get an F. It is the student's responsibility to drop the course.</b> Attendance is mandatory, and counts as 5% of your total grade. Every absence, tardiness, early departure for any reason, or in class distractions (such as cell phones or computers) could result in a loss of 1%. If a student misses three classes, he or she may be dropped. However the the ultimate responsibility of dropping the course lies with the student.</p>
<b>Withdrawal Policy</b>	<p>The withdrawal deadline for the quarter is <b>February 26<sup>th</sup> , 2016</b>. If students withdraw before this date, they will receive a "W". After this date, an "F".</p>
<b>Academic Honesty and Discipline Policy</b>	<p>Students are expected to abide by the college code of conduct. All work turned in is to be the student's own. Students giving or receiving help on a test or quiz will forfeit all points for that assignment and may be withdrawn from the course with a grade of "F". For take home assignments, any student turning in a work, which is strikingly similar to that of another student, will be required to schedule a conference to discuss the matter with the instructor, and any evidence of cheating will result in no points for that assignment and will be reported for further action. I take cheating very seriously and reserve the right to put the incident in your permanent record.</p>
<b>Honors Cohort</b>	<p>An Honors cohort is being offered in this section. If you are in the Honors Program you are welcome to participate in the cohort. If you are not in the Honors Program but are eligible for the program, you are also welcome to participate as long as you have not taken an Honors class from De Anza previously. Eligibility requirements can be found at <a href="http://deanza.edu/honors">http://deanza.edu/honors</a> or you may contact dahonors@deanza.edu with your name, SID, and the Honors course you are interested in taking. The cohort entails additional work in order to earn an Honors credit for this class on your transcript. Once you commit to the Honors portion, you will be expected to complete the extra work. Failure to complete the Honors work will result in a lowering of your Honors course grade. Honor students' grade will be out of 110 points where the extra 10 points is for your honor project. Hence, if an honor student chooses not to complete the honor project, the final grade would be at most <math>100/110 = 91</math> which is A-.</p>

<b>Expected Student Conduct</b>	<p>A student who is disruptive will be asked to leave the class. A student who refuses to leave the room will be dropped from the class and will be reported for further action.
